Gift Catalogue: The Impact It Has On Communities

By gifting supplies, World Vision offers a way for communities to use the resources they obtain to learn how to become resourceful themselves! In one case, a family was gifted two goats, and was trained on how to properly care for the goats. With the goats, the children of the family got access to milk, and the family gained a source of income. In another situation, bicycles gifted to communities were used as transport methods for kids to get to school (some of which are more than 7 km away). Not only did the bicycles increase the sense of safety of these kids, but also saved commuting times that can be used for other responsibilities.



Gift Ideas:

1. Emergency Food

Helps support combatting famine.

2. Clean Water Fund

 Promotes healthy living, and prevents spread of worms and diseases like cholera.

3. Piglets and Chicks

 Another source of income, as well as a source of food.

4. Lucky Iron Fish

 Placing these iron fishes into boiling pots releases iron and can be ingested; a much-needed nutrient.

5. Baby Kits
